Guest Speaker: **Paul Boscher**

Paul will present a slide show which illustrates the history of the eastern American forest, how it was dramatically changed by European settlement, the devastating impacts on fisheries, and how today we are working to restore those streams and recreate vibrant cold water fisheries.

Paul is a long time volunteer with Trout Unlimited in the US, having had involvement in every part of the organization from helping run youth education in his local chapter to serving on the national board of trustees. He led an effort to engage Trout Unlimited members in developing collaborations with land trusts to protect important cold water streams and their watersheds.

Last month Paul presented a slide show to the club on fishing in the world famous spring creeks of the Yellowstone valley north of Yellowstone National Park. which was very well received.

# President's Page

Finally, some settled weather in Wellington. With that of course comes drier conditions and lower rivers. For the first two weeks of February the Wainuiomata River has been running at around 0.43 cumecs, its low flows as permitted by Wellington Water's resource consent. Similarly, flows in the Hutt River have been just over 3 cumecs at Taita Gorge. At these flows the river gets very warm on hot days. The Hutt River has been peaking at over 23 0 C for six days in the past seven. It is generally recognised that brown trout become stressed at temperatures over 21 0 C. Fortunately the water temperature has been dropping to more acceptable temperatures in the mid-teens in the early hours of the morning, and as such the trout are more likely to be feeding and active at day-break. (I cannot find evidence that water temperatures are even monitored in the Wainuiomata River.)

It is disappointing to note that while our fisheries suffer, the Wellington City Council admits that 'Approximately 20 per cent of treated water never makes it to taps - though in reality the council has no idea exactly how much water is lost, because there is no reliable data.' In a discussion on the problem: 'Rush said the amount of drinking water lost to leaks was starting to put a strain on the supply coming from the Hutt River.' Source: Dominion Post 24 January. I absolutely agree with Sean Rush.

With those thoughts in mind I am looking forward to hearing from Paul Doscher again. Paul gave us an excellent presentation in February on fishing the spring creeks flowing alongside the Yellowstone River in Montana. The incredible productivity of these streams is testament to the benefits of a stable flow and temperatures. The Selwyn River in Canterbury used to be a hugely productive river, fed by the aquifers that extend across the Canterbury Plains, but that is long gone. The

Tukituki River is also regularly reaching high temperatures. Trout in the lower reaches of the Tukituki survive by seeking out the cooler springs that enter the river at various points. Lose those springs and the picture could be quite different there.

Paul will speak to the next Club meeting in March on the land restoration work he has been involved in with the objective of restoring some important trout streams in the US. I encourage you to attend this meeting and gain an appreciation of just how complex the whole question of preserving river amenities can be.

# NEW ZEALAND FEDERATION OF FRESHWATER ANGLERS

Wellington Flyfishers has for many years been a member of the Federation which is made up of Freshwater fishing Clubs up and down the country. The role of its executive is to make public comment and submissions on any issue which effects freshwater angling and in particular the environment, and there are numerous examples each year where NZFFA have been an active participant in various considerations both local and national.

In August last year, the Federation in conjunction with Pub Charity purchased a water testing machine which can give instant readings on nitrate level of any water source and in recent weeks has been testing water bore samples in the Canterbury area.

Below is the preliminary report which highlights some serious issues with water quality in that area.

“This morning President Peter set up shop at the Ashburton Racecourse and with my assistance we tested 75 bore water samples that locals brought in. A local paper had advertised the service for us. From 9.30 am until about 12.15 pm we never got a break. We had copies of the attached article which I had put on our website over a year ago. On it I wrote peoples' readings for them to take away. On memory the highest was over 12 mgN/L i.e. over the legal maximum and enough to give the Regional Medical Officer concern.

We were, of course, using the portable nitrate tester that NZFFA acquired last August.

The service was free but we suggested a donation. **We got \$255** for the NZFFA. Only a handful did not contribute and they all apologised for having no cash on them. One man went home and printed off more copies of the article for later arrivals.

We have not had time to analyse the figures yet but on first glance the Ashburton area figures appear to be at least twice the Christchurch rural area ones. There were quite a few up in the "danger zone". It was a happy coincidence that the 9 am news on RNZ this morning announced that Prof Mike Davison of Otago University is to head a NZ study to follow up on the Nitrate to Colo-rectal cancer link found in the Danish study (see article). The news item, pointed out the six other overseas studies have confirmed the link.

Many of our "clients" had heard this news item. Appreciation of what we (NZFFA) were doing was very high. Not one of the people, mainly farmers and other rural dwellers, was negative about anglers or NZFFA's work.

Several questioned the role/performance of the regional council to monitoring and publicising the nitrate dilemma that New Zealand (Canterbury and Southland in particular), faces."

The final report will be prepared and sent to the relevant health authorities.

# TIE ON A BLOWFLY

Only 55km from Hanmer Springs, the Sedgemere Lakes sit in glaciated hollows on a broad tussocky saddle between the Wairau and Severn Rivers, surrounded by rugged mountains. We discovered them on a previous trip through Molesworth, and were keen to make a return visit on the way back from a West Coast tramping trip. This time, we had our rods ready.

On Waitangi Day we stocked up on provisions in Hanmer and continued on into the high country. Bowscale Tarn is an hour's walk from the carpark, past Lake Sedgemere and over a low hill. When we arrived mid-afternoon a few fish were rising near the lake



edge, but none were impressed with Nick's woolly bugger or my tassie devil. Fortunately there was another fisherman working his way along the opposite shore, and when he'd finished fishing he rode over on his e-bike for a chat. With 47 years experience fishing these lakes, he'd whiled away his afternoon catching about 30 of them, and recommended that we



tie on a blowfly and move over to the stretch he'd just fished, where the fish were concentrated. Good advice – we had a few rises to our humpy blowflies but without a hookup, although I did manage to foulhook a nice fat brown of about 2 ½ lbs. All too soon it was evening, time to walk back and set up camp at the DOC Sedgemere Shelter.



Next morning started with a 2km walk to Fish Lake. There were good numbers of cruising eels, and some cruising trout as well. Eventually one of them



chomped my blowfly, and I had a fish on, another nice brown of around 2 ½ lbs. But alas, no landing net with us, and no easy place to bring it ashore. I walked it 100m or so towards the shallow end of the lake planning to haul it up onto a grassy patch, but in the end it released itself unharmed by bending the cheap Chinese hook. Go fish! Strong winds allowed only short casts as we progressed around the lake edge. A few more rises to the blowfly in the now murky water, but no more hook-ups.

After lunch we continued our journey down the Wairau, stopping by the river at a good-looking stretch. Strong wind was



still a problem, but after extracting his rig from the matagouri a couple of times, Nick got a good cast in. With the net ready this time, he landed a superb brown. Enthused, he disappeared upriver for over an hour to explore more lies, but on his return reported no takes.

The rest of the drive down the Wairau was spectacular, particularly through the rugged gorge of Hell's Gate. We passed plenty of brilliant looking water, but no time to get rods out and explore as we had to be out of the Rainbow Station gate before 6pm.

High on the agenda for next summer is another trip into the area. But allowing ourselves more time to spend hunting for fish in Lake Tennyson, Lake Guyon and the Clarence River as well as the wonderful Sedgemere Lakes.

# FLY OF THE MONTH

## Parachute Adams

A simple, easy to tie yet effective dry fly. Very useful as summer progresses. Many Trout at this time ignore high floating dries preferring insects trapped in the surface film. Snipping the hackle at the bottom of a standard dry can also achieve a lower-floating dry fly.



<b>Hook</b>	TMC 9300 size 12 – 18
<b>Tail</b>	Brown and grizzly hackle fibres
<b>Wing</b>	White calf body hair
<b>Body</b>	Dubbed grey muskrat or similar synthetic
<b>Hackle</b>	Brown or grizzly

If anyone has suggestions for fly patterns they would like to see tied at the flytying meetings please let us know. This will give us an opportunity to plan ahead and order materials well in advance.
